India & Sri Lanka Ablaze!

Our Lutheran Heritage

Concordia Seminary, Nagercoil, organized the annual Pastors Refresher Course for the India Evangelical Lutheran Church on June 13-15th. The theme was "Our Lutheran Heritage." Featured guest presenters from the LCMS were: Dr. Robert Kolb (Concordia Seminary, St. Louis), Dr. Richard Carter (Concordia University-St. Paul), Rev. David Birner (LCMS World Mission Dir. for Int'l. Mission), and Dr. Herbert Hofer (LCMS Area Director for India and Sri Lanka). In attendance were 230 pastors, deaconesses, and seminary students, including 15 from the Lanka Lutheran Church.

75th Anniversary

Mt. Zion Lutheran Church in the hill station of Kodaikanal, South India, celebrated its 75th anniversary on June 11th. The building was constructed by LCMS missionaries for their boarding school

children and vacation use. Now a congregation of the India Evangelical Lutheran Church meets there. The LCMS World Mission Area Director, Rev. Hofer, preached for the occasion, representing the missionaries of the past and celebrating the IELC congregation's unique ministry.

The church has become a major pilgrimage center. The building is open all day for pilgrims, but Friday is the special day for people to come to the church to pray to Jesus, sometimes numbering up a thousand. This development over the past ten years is part of the continuous movement toward Christ by caste Hindus around the country, usually outside the church.

Kidnapped Seminarian Freed

The Lanka Lutheran Church has 12 students in an informal seminary training program. The students are already involved in church planting, each assigned to

various regions of the 500 plus tea plantations where the church works in central Sri Lanka. In February, there was a mass baptism of 82 new believers, but people from two of the plantations were prevented from coming for their baptism by Hindu radicals. Later, Francis, the seminarian who was working on one of these plantations never returned home after one of his visits to the region. For six weeks, the church leaders and police searched for the young man. In answer to many prayers, both in Sri Lanka and around the world, the seminarian

32nd Lutheran Choir Festival

The Lutheran Choir Festival opened in Seoul on June 25, 2006, organized by the Women's Association of Lutheran Church in Korea (LCK). The choir festival is held every year to give LCK church members an opportunity for exchange and cooperation.

Summer Bible Schools

Summer Bible Schools were held during July and August at all Lutheran congregations in Korea to reach out to students from kindergarten up to the university level. For this year's Summer Bible School, the Education Committee of the LCK invited teachers to a workshop in July to help acquaint them with various resources like textbooks for Bible studies and training for singing and choreography. The Summer Bible Schools are held annually and beginning next year will fall under the leadership of local churches.

Gyeonggi-Incheon Pastor Association

The association of pastors from the region surrounding Seoul held its regular meetings on July 3 and September 4-5. These official meetings aim to foster the exchange of church news and sharing of fellowship among the pastors.

2006 PLI Conference

The 2006 Pastoral Leadership Institute (PLI) Conference was held on July 17-21 in Gyeonggi Province and included 40 participants. As in preceding years, LCK organized the Conference in cooperation with PLI in the United States. Eight speakers from the U.S.A. participated in the Conference. This year's conference followed the theme "Evangelization and Sermon" and focused on the reality of ministry situations. The conference was well received by all participants.

Women's Association Retreat

This year's Women's Association Retreat was held on August 7-8 at Luther University in Yongin City, Gyeonggi Province under the theme "Fill the Jars to the Brim" (John 2). The participation of 11 Asia representatives from Japan, Hong Kong, and Taiwan gave the retreat an international atmosphere.

2006 Retreat for Pastors

The LCK Social Welfare Committee organized a pastor's retreat from August 14-17 in Donghae, Gangwon Province. A total of 30 families participated and enjoyed the program which included worship services and fellowship meetings, as well as free time for families to rest and spend time together.

Lutheran Hour Korea Update

- In May the Lutheran Hour Korea (LHK) opened its "Christian Art Center" as a Center for Christian culture and a Christian gift shop. It exhibits and sells assorted items such as books, media, and symbols of our Lutheran traditions.
- In June, LHK provided the Lutheran Hour Myanmar with items to support its mission in Myanmar.
- LHK is extending "Equipping to Share" (ETS), a mission education program for lay church members, to also include youth. ETS is a 1-2 day program designed to educate lay members about the necessity and practical methods of mission. At present 20 to 30 mission groups and associations participate in ETS.
- Through its website, LHK offers various worship

service materials according to the liturgical calendar and makes these materials available to its members. It is planned to extend this service and offer more materials in the future. The LHK site can be found at: (www.lutheranhour.co.kr).

- LHK has started a youth program. As a first step, ten members of LHK have formed a Gospel Band. They intend to meet for practice four times a month and participate in mission meetings every other month. It is not a professional music band but it is full of joy to spread God's Word through prayer and exercise. All band members are LHK volunteers.

LTU Hosts International Academic Symposium

On August 18, Luther Theological University (LTU) hosted an international Academic Symposium which included participants from Germany, Japan, and Korea. Dr. Ingo Holzapfel from Ludwigshafen University, Germany, gave the keynote presentation on "The Nursing Care Insurance and Diaconal Work in Germany." A total of 12 professors and students from four universities in three countries - Japan Lutheran College and Japan Lutheran Theological Seminary, Japan, Pyeongtaek University and LTU, Korea, and Ludwigshafen University, Germany - gave presentations in two different fields of research: Theology and Social Welfare. LTU hopes that in this era of globalization this type of international symposium will help contribute to students' better understanding of international contexts.

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CISS Mourns the Passing of Dr. Rittmann

It is with great sadness that Concordia International School Shanghai (CISS) learned of the passing of its Head of School, Dr. David Rittmann, who died of a sudden heart attack on July 4, 2006, in Seattle, Washington.

Dr. Rittmann was Head of School at Concordia Shanghai from 2002 to 2006, and previously served for 23 years at Concordia's sister school, Hong Kong International School, nineteen as Head of School. His teaching ministry began in 1964 when he served several Lutheran schools in the U.S. prior to assuming his position in Hong Kong. He will be remembered for his academic excellence and inspiring leadership by many, both within and outside of Concordia's extended community. Dr. Rittmann touched the lives of many families, children and educators throughout the world, all who feel blessed to have known him.

Gloria Dei Christian School Receives HKIS Donated Computers

On July 15, 2006, Gloria Dei Christian School (GDCS) was most appreciative to receive 30 sets of computers from Hong Kong International School (HKIS). Mrs. Gutierrez, principal of Gloria Dei, called it "Christmas in July", saying that for four years the school personnel had been wishing for a miracle to replace their broken down computers.



This wonderful gift came about as a result of connections made at last November's Asia Ablaze! Summit in Hong

Kong, which was held at HKIS. While there, Rev. James Cerdanola, President of the Lutheran Church in the Philippines, and Mr. Abraham Tablizo, Chairman of the Board of GDCS, met leaders of HKIS and learned that the school donates its used computers to other non-profits. Mr. Tablizo put in a request for 30 computers which HKIS was able to fill.

Mrs. Gutierrez went on to say, "...heaven's door opened and not only a drizzle dropped down to our school but a downpour of blessing as the delivery truck came. Our teachers and pupils witnessed box after box being unloaded and brought to our computer room. The following day, the pupils crowded around the boxes and their faces beamed with pleasure and awe as each computer was lifted up from its box and set on the tables. Teachers and students alike were overjoyed as they could now for the first time do the prescribed IT curriculum (a program called Tekkids developed by the University of the Philippines IT Center). Yes, they have the chance of a hands-on experience as never before."

With God directing the *Ablaze!* move-

ment, Gloria Dei Christian School is looking forward to more ministry partners in reaching out to the children. And GDCS is especially looking forward to continuing to partner with HKIS as this most recent collaboration was such a success!

More than 100 Attend LCP Ablaze! Summit

"How long did you hike to get here?" asked Rev. James Cerdeñola to begin his presentation at the North Luzon Highland District *Ablaze!* Summit of the Lutheran Church in the Philippines (LCP). Several participants had to hike two or three hours and then take several more hours riding in a bus to get to the conference. A pair of women, however, had the longest hike—eight hours!

Can you imagine hiking eight hours to get to a church meeting?! This was not an ordinary church meeting, however. This was a Summit designed to help pastors, laymen, laywomen and youth catch the Philippine *Ablaze!* vision of starting 100 new LCP Congregations by the year 2017. It is an audacious goal! It will only be reached as every member of the LCP participates in doing what they can to make the vision a reality.

Rev. Cerdeñola set the tone for the Summit by outlining the history of the *Ablaze!*

movement and how the LCP has taken ownership of the vision. He outlined the seven mission responses and emphasized how every LCP member needs to be involved to make the vision a reality.

Later in the Summit, participants wrestled with identifying the barriers that keep every Filipino from becoming actively involved in sharing the Gospel. Shyness, lack of support, lack of training, and several other barriers seemed almost insurmountable as the group listed them one by one. Rev. Ao-as, president of the North Luzon Highland District summed all of the barriers up very clearly when he said, "The biggest barrier to my being fully committed to sharing the Gospel is myself."

Later in the Summit, when the group was asked to work on solutions one woman objected, "We know the problems, but we came here for you to give us the solutions." It is the members of the North Luzon Highland District themselves who must overcome these barriers as they wrestle and pray together. A common theme arose as group after group reported their ideas on how to overcome the barriers to sharing the Gospel. This theme was that "we must rededicate ourselves to Bible Study and we must get out and just do it."

In the final session of the Summit, the 128 participants met with members of their own churches and came up with very specific plans for implementing the vision of *Ablaze!* in their home areas.

There were a lot of smiles as the Summit ended and people started their long journeys back to their homes. One participant said as he was leaving, "Thank you for explaining to me how I can be *Ablaze!* with the Gospel of Jesus Christ." We pray that he and all the other participants will keep that flame and set Northern Luzon on fire with the Gospel.



MISSION CENTRAL TEAM & IOWA WEST VISIT ASIA

After years of support and partnership in so many projects and ways in Asia, LCMS World Mission was thrilled with the visit of Gary Thies and his team of volunteers to Asia. They were accompanied by the President of Iowa West District, Rev. Paul Sieveking and his wife, Sue. After coming as a group to Hong Kong the various teams split off to visit the work in China, Indonesia, Vietnam, and Cambodia before retuning to Hong Kong for debriefing and strategy talks with the LCMS Asia Management Team.

While in Vietnam, the team visited one of the newly built and almost completed health stations (see picture of groundbreaking). Through such communal health stations, which serve scores of villages, LCMS World Mission is able to interface with and meet the needs of thousands of people.



Passion Flamed

In working with Open Gate Christian Church, Pastor Unrion and Pastor Naro talked about the powerful influence that the Asia *Ablaze!* Summit in Hong Kong had on their ministry. They shared that they had returned from the Summit with the vision that they would encourage each of their members to share Jesus with one person in a month. As they progressed with this plan they were surprised when members reported that they had gone well beyond this expectation of reaching one person. These encouraging reports fanned their excitement and they began to vision about what would happen if other Christian churches in Cambodia purposefully planned this same sort of sharing witness to Christ. They shared their excitement with local pastors at a meeting and began to work with these pastors to

involve many other Christian pastors in the "each one reach one" congregational strategy. In the planning stage is a Christian pastoral gathering which will expose other Christian leaders to the *Ablaze!* sharing strategy and further plan deliberate efforts to win "Cambodia for Christ."

Come and Help Us

Jeanette Groth, LCMS World Mission missionary, was thrilled to be called (much like her favorite Bible story as a child, "The Macedonian Call") by a group of Christians in the Sihanoukville area of Phnom Penh. As they talked about working together and strengthening one another in mission, one young pastor looked at Jeanette and asked, "Could you come and meet the church leaders of our fifteen churches? From there we can build a bond and you can come and teach our

Sunday School teachers so they can teach our children more about Jesus." What a wonderful invitation! The Spirit is working and providing more opportunities to bring the light of God's Word to the hearts of the Cambodian people.

Only One?

The Groth's are busy planning workshops to teach leaders ways to share Jesus. Because these workshops are to be intense and are to build teaching to be taken back to others, the number is limited to twelve. As leaders select participants it is almost heart wrenching to hear the question—"You mean we can send only ONE?" What a call to play a role in making Cambodia *Ablaze!* with the power of God's Spirit in sharing the Good News with others.

What happens when you put 20 teenagers, half a dozen adults, and the Holy Spirit together on the South China Sea on a sunny Friday afternoon in September? Combustion and an *Ablaze!* moment! On Friday, September 1, 2006 several youth and their leaders from Church of All Nations (CAN) in Hong Kong invited friends to attend an afternoon and evening of wakeboarding, swimming, eating and fellowship. Pizzas were delivered by speed boat and CAN member, Jeff Shupe, as music played on both the front and upper decks. Through prayer, devotions, and personal sharing, six youth uncommitted to Christ were witnessed to by CAN youth. Also, at one point in the evening the boat captain, a local Hong Kong Chinese gentleman, went to the front of the boat to inquire about Jesus, our prayers, and the faith of these young people— another *Ablazing* moment! was suddenly released by his Hindu captors. Thanks be to God. The work on this plantation continues through these courageous young men.

Funds for New Church Sites

The "Jesus Is Lord" mission society has raised funds to help with the planting of new churches in India and Sri Lanka. Through the work of seminary graduates who are serving as church planters during their probation period, God is raising up many new congregations. On average, the purchase of a site for one of these new congregations in India is around \$10,000. In Sri Lanka, the strategy is to establish a "Mission Station" consisting of a parsonage-cum-community hall (for worship, training, pre-school, after school ministries, etc.) at \$15,000 each. JILM has recently provided \$35,000 toward these needs. Thanks be to God.

Kong. Some 1,000 people are expected to attend. At the gathering the LCHK Synod will unveil its four step approach to *Ablaze!* with a specific program designed for greater and greater spread of the gospel in Hong Kong. The first program is to address the needs of 1,000 families in the Lutheran Social Services net of relationships (brochure on the far right). The second program is the ministry to "the least" in Hong Kong using the churches, schools and social welfare to break the cycle of poverty among Hong Kong's underprivileged (brochure on the far left). The third program is a Parent's Hotline that seeks to connect LCHK Synod school families to Christian counselors (brochure second to the left). The fourth program is focused on internationalizing the LCHK Synod schools through the use of short term Christian teams and volunteers from the US and abroad (brochure second from the right). All of these programs will be on display at 130 locations throughout

A New School Year Starts!

Praise God for the opportunity in Asia to witness to students both in large settings (as in the picture below) but also in a more personal one-on-one relationship. Concordia Middle School, one of Asia's 200+ Lutheran schools, began the new school year with God's word, encouragement from Christian teachers, and prayer. This year there are 14 LCMS teachers, three of them new, who have come to Chiayi, Taiwan to witness to their love for Jesus as they teach English at Concordia Middle School. Please pray that the 100,000+ students and staff throughout the Lutheran schools in Asia will also know that God cares for them both at the beginning, middle and end of all things!

China Service Learning Event

This past June, an opportunity arose for nine high school students of Concordia Middle School (CMS) to participate in a China Service Learning Event organized by Marty Schmidt of Hong Kong International School (HKIS). The event combined youth members of a Lutheran church in California, a university teacher from Indonesia, a few present and former HKIS students, and these nine CMS students.

Mike Kersten and Matt Wasmund, LCMS missionaries currently serving in Taiwan, led the group of CMS students on what was for many their first time out of the country. The week-long service learning experience focused on God's grace given to us and how we may, in turn, help others. The main outlet of service during this week was assisting first-hand at an orphanage in Guangdong Province. The workers, very flexible and open to the group's arrival, allowed them to jump right in with the daily care of the children who ranged in age from newborns to 12 years old. Feed-



ing the children, playing with them, sitting with them in therapeutic sessions, or just holding them were ways the group found they were able to offer assistance. The children's response to individual attention was moving; their joy at making new friends unforgettable.

Discussions were held in the evenings, providing a forum of reflection focusing on how we all are like orphans, separated from our Heavenly Father yet brought back to a relationship with Him through the work of Jesus. Of the group, only two of the students were Christians, but all were greatly affected by the children. In the simple words of one of the participants: "[This experience] changed my life."

Praise God for this network of coworkers in Christ and the chance to serve together.



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
